

ORD 97-2  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF PINE VALLEY  
IN THE COUNTY OF CAMDEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY  
PROHIBITING TRESPASSING ON PRIVATE PROPERTY

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Commission of the Borough of Pine Valley, in the County of Camden, State of New Jersey, that:

1. FINDINGS. The private property of the Borough must be protected from unlawful activity of persons which injures and destroys the property physically and causes depreciation of property values.

2. PURPOSE. The purpose of this ordinance shall be to protect and preserve private property in the Borough from injury or destruction by trespassing of persons and to proscribe penalties for violations of this ordinance. This ordinance is declared to be remedial and essential for the public interest and shall be liberally construed to effectuate its purpose.

3. PROHIBITIONS.

A. No person shall drive any motor vehicle, motorcycle, or other vehicle upon private property in the Borough without prior permission of the owner of the private property.

B. In the event that a vehicle is illegally parked on private property in violation of this ordinance, the Borough police department is authorized to have such vehicle towed away, and the owner of the vehicle shall be required to pay the towing costs to recover possession of the vehicle

without the prior permission of the owner of the private property on foot

C. No person shall trespass on private property on foot without the prior permission of the owner of the private property.

4. PENALTY. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) or by imprisonment not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

5. EFFECT. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption and publication according to law and be known as Public Law Ordinance # PLO-97-003.
